Overall Progress

- Inspections
 - o 2nd round for Del Mar, Poway, and Solana Beach
 - Continuing 1st round in National City and Vista
- Enforcement
 - Through 2023, inspections are educational to improve business compliance
 - o Enforcement begins Jan 1, 2024 and must be implemented by cities
 - o Solana Center will support enforcement with field findings
- Initial annual Food Recovery Capacity for EAR reporting:
 - Del Mar No food recovery orgs; potential for one in 2024
 - o Encinitas 610,000 lbs.
 - National City 2,645,000 lbs.
 - o Poway 1,457,000 lbs.
 - Solana Beach No food recovery orgs
 - o Vista 641,000 lbs.



Insights from the Field - Tier 1 Businesses

- Grocery Stores
 - Big chains have donation programs
 - Small stores need assistance
 - Recordkeeping and maximum donation are focus of inspections
- Wholesalers
 - Significant donation possible from bakeries
 - Additional labor and packaging cost is hurdle
- Food Service Providers
 - Food donation potential is low
 - Checking for recordkeeping compliance



Insights from the Field - Tier 2 Businesses

Restaurants

- Few have donation programs need ad hoc programs for compliance
- Businesses prefer waste prevention and donation to staff

• Schools

- Districts are mostly receptive
- Additional labor and packaging cost is challenging

• Hospitals

- Large hospitals have programs
- Assisted Living Facilities need to establish donation

• Events

• Limited amounts due to DEHQ requirements

Annual Inspections

- Follow-up inspections are scheduled 1 year after the first inspection
- Staff turnover in food businesses necessitates periodic inspections to ensure programs continue

Enforcement

- Enforcement of Tier 1 and 2 businesses starts Jan 1, 2024
- Solana Center will assist cities

Technical Assistance

- With enforcement in effect, technical assistance to businesses will help with compliance

Tier Identification & Capacity Planning

- Last round was submitted Aug 2022
- Next round spans Jan 1, 2025 to Dec 31, 2034

Annual Education & Outreach

- Covers disposal and donation
- Examples include resource guides, flyers, social media, newsletters, videos, webinars

Recordkeeping

- Data must be updated within 60 days of activity
- Solana Center maintains Edible Food Recovery records for each city
- With new access to EDCO's businesses database, Solana may begin updating there





PAPER / PLASTIC / PACKAGING WASTE REDUCTION



Senate Bill (SB) 777 Solid Waste: Transparency in Grocery Bag Recycling Act Allen(D)

- Polices how grocery store chains use 10-cent charge for reusable bags
- A portion of the 10-cent charge to be spent on offering customers ability to return bags for recycling
- Imposes new accounting and reporting requirements on large grocery store chains
- Quarterly reports to CalRecyle
 - Union Reps get copies



Senate Bill (SB) 728 Plastic Gift Card Ban Limon (D)

- Would ban sale / distribution of plastic gift cards in CA beginning in 2027
- Does not apply to some gift cards usable with multiple sellers

gift card

- Does not apply to plastic cards used to pay transit fees
- Civil Fines for Violations
 - ▶ 1st Violation: \$25 per retailer per day
 - Subsequent Violations: \$100 per retailer per day
- Cities authorized to enforce

Plastic Pollution Prevention and Packaging Producer Responsibility Act (SB 54) Amendments

- AB 1526 (Omnibus Bill)
 - Clarifies how local jurisdiction costs will be reimbursed by producers
- **SB** 303 (Allen)
 - Clarifies regulations regarding responsible end markets for covered materials
 - Creates ADR process for claims that implementation actions threaten operator commercial viability




Plastic Pollution Prevention and Packaging Producer Responsibility Act (SB 54) Amendments

- ► AB 1489 (Wood)
 - Exempts "compostable" plastics from SB 54's requirements
- SB 665 (Allen)
 - Creates a working Group to study novel plastic and plastic-alternative material types used to produce singleuse products


Senate Bill (SB) 353 Bottle Bill Amendments

Dodd (D), Blakespear (D), Gonzalez (D), Roth (D), Sen. Carrillo (D) & Sen. Kalra (D)

- Expands the CRV Program to include large fruit juice (> 46 oz) and vegetable juice (> 16 oz) containers
- Updates certain definitions, labeling requirements, and tasting room exemptions (expands to beer tasting rooms).
- Establishes \$60 per-ton temporary transportation, operations, and logistics payment to rural glass recyclers
- Changes methodology CalRecycle uses to calculate processing payments to recyclers to protect recyclers from large swings in processing fee payments due to market fluctuations




ELECTRONIC WASTE



Senate Bill (SB) 244 Right to Repair Act Eggman (D)


- Gives consumers the right to repair consumer electronics and appliances sold in CA after July 1, 2021
- Manufacturers would have to make information, parts and tools available to owners and repair shops for up to 7 years
- Violators subject to civil fines of \$1,000 per day for 1st violation, \$2,000 per day for 2nd violation, and \$5,000 per day for subsequent violations
- Cities authorized to enforce law
- Intent is to encourage owners to repair broken electronics and appliances instead of putting them into the waste stream



Senate Bill (SB) 568 Export of Electronic Waste Newman (D)

Requires an exporter to demonstrate that covered electronic waste or devices cannot be managed by an instate e-waste recycler before they can be exported to another state or a foreign country


Assembly Bill (AB) 1526 Paint Stewardship Law Amendments

Assembly Committee on Natural Resources

- Expands California's Paint Stewardship Law to cover aerosol spray paint and similar aerosol coating products
- Manufacturers or PRO will have until July 1, 2026 to submit an aerosol paint stewardship plan to CalRecycle for approval
- Also changes due date for Paint Care annual report from November 1st to May 15th




Senate Bill (SB) 613 Low-Population Exemption from SB 1383 Seyarto (R)

- Exempts very small jurisdictions from SB 1383 and SB 1383 regulations
- Exemption only applies to a jurisdiction that disposes < 5,000 tons of solid waste per year and has a population < 7,500 residents</p>




Senate Bill (SB) 751 Solid Waste Franchise Agreements Padilla (D)

- Prohibits force majeure provisions in franchise agreements that excuse compliance with agreement in the event of work stoppage associated a labor dispute
- Requires franchise agreement to contain provisions that apply in the event of a work stoppage due to labor dispute that:
 - Require notice to customers of service interruption;
 - Provide a process for taking and responding to customer complaints; and
 - Allow customers to receive refunds or credits for services not received.
- Applies to franchise agreements entered into or materially altered after January 1, 2024
